Blue Winged Olive Soft Hackles

When fishing with Michelle Lunebach and D.J. Mathieu at the Timber Coulee during the Lee Wulff Spring Outing, Michelle noticed a BWO hatch that the trout were going after quite actively. Although I had some BWO dries with me, which worked well, I didn't have any BWO soft hackles immediately available.

Based on the BWO dries that I purchased several years ago, I experimented in tying a couple – both with and without wings (too long in the enclosed pic), as follows:



Hook – Daiichi 1550 size 14 – 16 (wet fly hook)

Thread – Olive Pearsall Gossamer silk

Body – Olive colored dyed Heron or Canada goose herl (4 barbs)

Ribbing – Gold or olive colored wire

* Wings - Optional) - Light to medium dun colored hen hackle tips

Hackle – Light to medium dun colored hen hackle

Although the commercially tied BWO dries that I had were tied without wire ribbing, because the heron or Canada goose herl can break quite easily, I decided to use a wire ribbing on these dressings.

Alternately, a BWO dry fly dubbing from Hareline or Fly Rite (without the wire ribbing) can be used for a closer match to the traditional BWO dries.

* Note: Top two flies are winged and hackled while the bottom two have only hen hackle wraps.
