Cozad's Driftless 1 Fly Contest is now in the books. Saturday March 28th, ten teams of four anglers left the Driftless Angler Fly shop at 8 am in pursuit of trout, bragging rights, and most importantly, raising money for TU Youth Fishing. This inaugural event was greeted with temps in the teens, blinding sun, and the lowest, clearest water anyone had seen. The Lee Wulff Team consisted of Gordon Rudd, Bill Kica, Jim Romberg and myself. Under brutal conditions we managed almost thirty fish, which placed us middle of the pack, perhaps a bit better. More than one in this unique group of 40 leading anglers, ( myself excluded ), was skunked. What was especially fun to see was Jacob, coming in 2nd overall, having caught 22 fish, all on the same streamer. Many of the streamer guys got snagged off early, and were out of the competition. This from Michigan guide Dustan Harley. "Spring is finally here and so are the steelhead. It took a while for the break to happen, but it sure feels nice. The fish have been eating eggs, small stones, and hexes pretty well on most days. They have been much easier to hook than to land because they are very fresh right now. We have seen some great fish landed so far this year including my longest fish ever. On March 27, Steve from Chicago, landed a 37" beast from the St. Joe! The most amazing thing isn't that he landed it on the 27th, but that he landed it again on the 28th! Not to be outdone, Tom from Richmond landed the same fish on the 30th! To make things even more unbelievable, it was Tom's first ever steelhead...That is the way March ended for me and what a great month it was.

April is looking to be good so far too. We have fresh fish coming in daily, the water is perfect, and the weather has been great for spring steel heading. If you sneak out to the water I wish you tight lines and bent rods."

# HERE IS WHAT YOU HAVE BEEN WAITING.. FOR A CHANCE TO HELP!

The Southern Wisconsin Chapter of TU had their first workday of the year on Saturday, March 14 on Pleasant Valley Branch along Dane County Rd H, about 1 1/2 miles south of County Rd. A. They are finishing the stretch of the stream where we last left off. A map for this location can be found by clicking on this link: <a href="http://binged.it/1C9hu26">http://binged.it/1C9hu26</a> When: Saturday, April 25, Saturday, May 9.. from 9 a.m. to Noon What: Willow and invasive brush removal to benefit trout stream habitat. Also friendly camaraderie, donuts, coffee, hot cocoa and a chance to give back to the resource!

**Where:** Pleasant Valley Branch Creek - Take Hwy 151 west out of Madison, on the west side of Mt. Horeb take Hwy 78 south 6.5 miles to Dane County Road H, turn left (south) on Cty Rd.H, Cty Rd. H will join Cty Rd A in 2 miles, turn left and in 1/2 mile H turns right. Our work site is about 1 1/2 miles south of Cyt Rd A on Cty Rd. H. You could also take Hwy 69 south out of Verona to Cty Rd A (8.5 miles), turn right (west) and follow Cty Rd A all the way to Cty Rd H (14.8 miles), and turn left (south) and go 1 1/2 miles. See the map link above.

**Bring:** Work gloves, loppers, and hand saws if you have them; otherwise the chapter has equipment you can use. Waders and rubber boots are suggested as we will be working on both sides of the stream. If you don't have any, you can work on the road side of the stream.

Parking: Park on the east side of the road.

There are many great trout streams, with easy access, in this part of the state. Some to mention include The Big Green, Castle Rock, Doc Smith, Crooked Creek the Blue and Big Spring. These streams have sizeable trout populations and sizeable fish.

Fennimore is located approximately 1 1/2 hours west of Madison.

## **Bob Olach's Fly Of The Month**

### Hare's Ear Flymphs

Was watching a YouTube video today about tying "Flymphs", a term supposed coined by Vernon (Pete) Hidy on the fly dressings developed by James Leisenring for trout fishing in the waters of Eastern Pennsylvania.

Subsequently, Pete Hidy writing a small book, named "The Art of Tying the Wet Fly & Fishing the Flymph", giving credit to himself and James Leisenring for the information and dressings they both fished.

In the past, I've tied several variations of Hare's Ear Flymphs using different colored silks and hen hackles. In "The Art of Tying the Wet Fly & Fishing the Flymph", Pete Hidy recommends using different hackles depending on the waters being fished – soft, hen hackles for slow moving waters; cockerel (young rooster) hackles and dry fly / rooster hackles for faster moving waters.

In tying these flymphs, I first waxed the silk; wrapped the silk towards the hook bend in tight turns tying in the gold wire approx. half way down the hook shank; tied in a bunch of feathers for the tail; dubbed the silk with Hare's Ear and wound the dubbing up to the thorax area; wound the gold wire rib up to and over the Hare's Ear thorax; tied in the hen hackle near the hook eye; wound the silk back down the shank over the Hare's Ear thorax; did 2 hackle turns at the hook eye and 3 turns behind the first 2 hackle turns; wrapped the silk over the 5<sup>th</sup> hackle turn over the thorax area; did 3 silk turns through the 5 hackle turns; did a whip finish and then trimmed the hackle stem and thread.



Here's the dressing for the flies shown:

### Hare's Ear Flymphs

Hook – Daiichi #1550 wet fly hook (sizes 12 - 16)

Thread – Pearsall 6a Gold Gossamer Silk (waxed with clear beeswax)

Under Thorax – Hare's Ear

Body – Pearsall 6a Gossamer silk dubbed with Hare's Ear and ribbed with gold wire Rib – Small gold wire

Hackle – Ginger colored hen (2 tight wraps near hook eye and 3 additional turns towards body)

Tail – approx. 10 -12 pieces of hackle taken from the same hen skin as the front hackle



## **Grumpy's Page by Kurt Haberl**

It was a frosty, early-season morning as we sat around a pathetic campfire someone had re-lit, drinking coffee and daring each other to be the first to wake up and put on cold waders to go fishing.

"Hey, Mary," Schnoz mumbled to Mary Compson, the one among us who at least looked like she was awake, "would you consider fishing with Grumpy and me this morning? I want to do an experiment, and to make it scientific, I need a control group to measure the results. I'd use Grumpy, but he only catches fish by luck or mistake."

"Well," Mary said, "if you two go upstream, I'll go downstream. I can run a wooly bugger through the deeper pools and fish a sinking nymph on the way back. I can't imagine there would be much of a hatch this early, maybe little black caddis or some blue winged olives, but not likely unless it warms up a lot. My brother tells me that midges are as good as anything in the early season."

"That's what experience says you should do," Schnoz said, "so I'm going to start with a big dry fly and a short tippet, and then switch to a grasshopper and then maybe anything else I can find in my box that would be wrong."

I said, "So the experiment is to see if trout are really just like Schnoz – contrary, unpredictable curmudgeons with a stubborn streak and an insatiable appetite for stuff that isn't really food."

I decided to help out by pulling a softball-sized rock from the bottom and tossing it into the pool in front of Schnoz.

"I'm helping you do everything wrong," I said.

"I don't need any help," he said. It was so true and so obvious that I didn't comment.

Our walkie-talkies crackled for a second and Mary said, "Fish. Pretty small, maybe eight inches. It's a brown."
