Bob Olach's Fly of the Month

HATCHING DUN MARCH BROWN SOFT HACKLE

About 2 ½ years ago, we had a little write – up on this fly dressing but since, it's going to be one of the dressings we do at the soft hackle fly tying session today (February 7th), thought it might be a good idea to provide the info again. (At tonight's sessions, we'll also do Pheasant Tail and Hare's Ear soft hackles in addition to the Hatching Dun March Brown.)

I first saw this dressing quite a few years ago when an on-line email was sent to me from a fly-fishing shop somewhere out West and the red dubbed thorax caught my attention.

Hare's Ear soft hackled dressings, with and without "hot spots," plus Flashback Hare's Ear and Pheasant Tail nymphs have all been good flies to use in the Cheese Country waters that I fish.

Since I really like to tie various March Brown soft hackles, this dressing caught my attention due to the reddish colored thorax area. (I used J. Fair's Red Seal Sub Dubbing for these but red-colored STS Trilobal or SLF dubbings also look good in this dressing).

You can use other colored dubbings for the thorax and remove the tails to make quite a few different Hare's Ear soft hackled "variations."



Hatching Dun March Brown Soft Hackle

Hook – Daiichi #1550 wet fly hook (sizes 12 - 14)

Thread – Uni-Thread 6/0 – Orange

Tails – Pheasant Tail fibers

Body – Light colored Hare's Ear Dubbing ribbed with gold wire

Rib – Small gold wire

Thorax – Red colored Dubbing

Hackle – Partridge (the gray-barred feather from a Hungarian Partridge)

Head – Uni-Thread 6/0 Orange

When Schnoz gets excited, I get worried. He sat next to me at my fly tying desk with a shoebox on his lap, and he was excited. His right knee bounced up and down like someone had put an electrode into whatever was left of his sciatic nerve.

"Grumpy, how old are you?" he said.

"Exactly. And when we all get together around the campfire, what do we talk about?"

"Trout fishing."

"After that?"
