Bob Olach's Fly Of the Month

Palmered Flies

As most of our LW Chapter members know, my “go-to” dry fly is a variation of Ed Story’s Crackleback pattern. In addition to the Crackleback, I also tie (and fish) several other “palmered hackled dressings” that also work quite well and bring up a lot of fish, even if those that aren’t rising at the time.

In going through some old files, I found some information dated 18 December 2006 but I can’t find any record of ever sending it to be included in one of our Chapter’s newsletters.

The enclosed pic was scanned quite a few years back when I was using fewer hackle turns on my palmered dressings than I do now. Several years ago, I switched from doing 2 hackle turns at the end of the hook shank and 5 ½ hackle turns towards the hook eye. Since then, I’ve added 1 additional hackle turn at **BOTH** the end of the hook shank and also on the body hackle.



Here’s the info on the palmered flies, modified slightly as I tie them:

Red Palmer (T. Pilling – 1794)

Hook – Daiichi #1190 dry fly barbless hook (sizes 12 - 16)

Thread – Red Pearsall Gossamer Silk or Danville 6/0

Body – Green peacock with gold wire ribbing

Hackle – Reddish brown saddle hackle

Black Palmer (taken from T. Hofland’s Book “The British Angler’s Manual” dated 1848)

Hook – Daiichi #1190 dry fly barbless hook (sizes 12 - 16)

Thread – Black Pearsall Gossamer Silk or Danville 6/0

Body – Black peacock (original calls for black ostrich but the peacock looks to be more durable) with silver wire ribbing

Hackle – Black saddle hackle

Soldier Palmer (also (taken from T. Hofland’s Book “The British Angler’s Manual dated 1848)

Hook – Daiichi #1190 dry fly barbless hook (sizes 12 - 16)

Thread – Red Pearsall Gossamer Silk or Danville 6/0

Body – Red Pearsall floss with gold wire ribbing

Tail – Red wool

Hackle – Reddish brown saddle hackle

Sometimes things don't go well. "That's not fair," Schnoz said. "You fall in the river on every trip anyway, so the only penalty for you is not catching any fish."

"If I take that Black Widower, I'll probably fall in two or three times on every trip, Wet Curtis said.

"But I really like the net I won," Schnoz said.

"Schnoz," Wet Curtis said, "you've already got a net. Grumpy, don't you have a cooler and a rain jacket already?"

"Yeah," I admitted.

"Okay, then it's settled," Curtis said. "And if anyone can't go on an outing, then he has to take the box with the curse in it, and keep it until the next trip."

We shuffled back out to the table. Word had spread, and there piled around Hook Line and Sinker was pretty much every prize won in the raffle that night. While Wet Curtis explained
