

Chapter Outings 2019

Early Spring Outing April 26th-28th - Viroqua, WI

This is our annual outing to Southwest WI in the Driftless area. Our Chapter will gather at the Vernon Inn in Viroqua, WI. For reservations call 800/501-0664. Let them know you are with the Lee Wulff Chapter of Trout Unlimited as a block of rooms has been reserved. Members are responsible for finding their own roommate, if they want one, and making their own reservations. Also, there's the Old Towne Motel in Westby, no association with the restaurant, Logan Mill Lodge and Central Express in Westby. Only the Vernon Inn has blocked rooms.

Some will be camping at the West Fork Sportsmans Club in Avalanche, WI. You must be a member to camp and the cost for membership is currently \$15 per year. The campground does not take reservations unless you are going to rent the cabin they have. www.westforksportsmansclub.org for more information. Because of the severe flooding last fall check to make sure they are open before arriving.

This area includes the famed West Fork of the Kickapoo, Timber Coulee, Bishops Branch, Tainter Creek and Elk Creek to mention only a few. The early WI season is open only to catch and release.

We offer, to current Lee Wulff members, an opportunity to spend some time with an experienced member. So, if you're new to the area, new to fly fishing or would like to hook up with, and spend some time with, an experienced member this is the trip for you. Bob Olach's Fly of the Month

Edmonds' & Lee's Bloa Dressings

"Brook & River Trouting"

In Edmonds' & Lee's book "Brook and River Trouting", there are several "Bloa" dressings shown and although slightly different in construction, they all have two things in common....namely the use of yellow silks and also a bluish / grayish hackle feather from various birds.

The word "Bloa" or "Blae" comes from the Scottish language and according to the Dictionary of Scot Language means "slate blue/gray".

These dressings are quite easy to tie and are effective in many trout waters. If the fly tier doesn't have the specified hackles stated in the dressings shown below, try a few different gray colored hen hackles.



Here are the original dressings, as taken from "*Brook & River Trouting*": (Note: I used size 14 Daiichi 1550 hooks in the flies pictured above.)

No. 9

Light Snipe or Snipe Bloa

Ephemeridae

Hook 1

Wings - Hackled with a bluish feather from the under coverts of a Snipe's

wing. (The lighter side of the feather toward the head).

Body - Yellow silk, No. 4.

Head - Yellow silk.

Middle of April to middle of May, and again in September.

No. 2

Waterhen Bloa

Ephemeridae

Hook 1 or 2

Wings - Hackled with a smoky grey feather from under coverts of a

Waterhen's wing. (The darker side of the feather towards the head of

the fly).

Body - Yellow silk, No. 4, dubbed with Mole's fur.

Head - Yellow silk.

March to end of April, again in September.

No. 16

Yellow-Legged Bloa

Ephemeridae

Hook 1

Wings - From a young Starling's light primary quill feather, the outer side of

the feather as the under side of the wing.

Body - Primrose yellow silk, No. 3.

Tail - Two strands from a very pale ginger Cock's hackle.

Legs - A Cock's hackle dyed a rich primrose yellow.

Head - Primrose yellow silk.

May to end of June.

No. 18 Poult Bloa Ephemeridae

Hook 0 or 1

Wings - Hackled with a light blue feather from the under coverts of a young

Grouse wing, taken before the bird is strong on the wing. (The lighter side of the feather towards the head of the fly.) This feather darkens

very rapidly on the live bird from August onwards.

Body - Primrose yellow silk, No. 3.

Head - Primrose yellow silk.

Middle of May to middle of June

It's weird, but I can tell when my phone rings that's it's Schnoz and not Annie or the doctor or some charity asking for help at Christmas time. Schnoz's ring sounds like he's been pushing buttons too hard or maybe he's causing a glitch in the laws of physics or electronics, kind of like a wrinkle in time.
